Borthwick Park blossoms

Borthwick Park is looking blooming marvellous. Lots of plants have flowered as the weather's warmed. The new QR code plant ID signs are in. Volunteers have removed lots of weedy grasses from the beds over the last 3 months. Council's maintenance crew has renovated the weathered benches and picnic tables.

The KRA committee is working with Council to remediate two worn patches of lawn either side of the halo bed around the big central river redgum. The track to the west could be covered with crushed quartzite by Council. Volunteers covered the worn area closer to the shelter with mulch for a softer look, but rest assured this popular travelway will NOT be blocked by plants. Heritage protection needed



The Council Assessment Panel's refusal to approve demolition of 69 High St is A WIN, but the old Kensington elementary school building is NOT SAFE YET, as owners have the right to appeal to the Environment Resources and Development Court to overturn or alter the CAP's decision.

Why is 69 High Street important? It is one of the oldest elementary school buildings in South Australia and one of the oldest single-room adaptive colonial buildings in existence. The single-storey building at 69 High Street was constructed from

bricks specifically commissioned by the owner, John William Roberts (1794-1875), from Thomas Constable who was one of the few skilled artisans living in Kensington in the 1840s. Some elements of heritage significance include the triangular gable roof, the brick pediment and the acroteria elements at the apex of the pediment. The building at 69 High Street is stylistically similar to State Heritage listed Heanes Bootshop at 53 Bridge Street which was built in 1850.



Kensington Residents' Association representatives Roger Bryson, Andrew Dyson and Jane Godsmark met with Premier Peter Malinauskas, Minister Nick Champion and Member for Dunstan, Cressida O'Hanlon, on

11th November, seeking improved heritage controls to protect the unique buildings of the Kensington Village precinct. The Premier was generous with his time and the KRA delegation was assured that Minister Champion is actively working to improve heritage outcomes. It is extremely important that the March 2023 recommendations of the Expert Panel for the Planning System Implementation Review, largely agreed to by the Malinauskas government in March 2024, are implemented as soon as possible to protect heritage buildings, such as 69 High St, from demolition by neglect.

Trash talk

Did you know? The trash rack in Second Creek, near the Thornton St bridge, is part of a network of some 20 sites across metro Adelaide, all owned and maintained by Green Adelaide. Data from the last 7 years show 5 to 25 tonnes of debris is caught and removed annually at the Thornton St trash rack. During the year ending June 2025, 10.61 tonnes of debris was removed and prevented from entering the sea.

Rainfall triggers a site inspection when 7mm falls in 24 hours or 10mm falls in 7 days. Without a rainfall trigger, sites are checked every 21 days. Depending on the fullness of the nets or messiness of the site, a clean may be scheduled. Green Adelaide's contractor Mechanical Vegetation Solutions needs access to parking spaces right next to the Thornton St bridge to pull the trash nets up for emptying. Prior to a clean, bollards are placed in this area by Council. Please don't shift the bollards!! If a car is parked there, the trash rack cannot be cleaned.


